Her paper titled Karma and the Inner I was well received at the 2004 WAVES Conference at Washington D.C.

More recently, Chitra served on a year-long strategic planning committee formed by the Michigan State Department of Education in order to formulate best practices for the education of children on the Autism spectrum. Working separately with the

local school district, she devised a creative teaching format to make the elementary school science curriculum more accessible to different learners.

Chitra's reading interests include anthropology, philosophy and religion, astronomy, the environment, and women's issues. Her eclectic taste in music includes Hindustani, Carnatic, Western Classical, and World Music.
